

BRIEF INFORMATION

The cost of meals has been greatly reduced in Columbus, Meals can be secured for about 25c within a block of the college. Many students reduce their expenses by working for their board, which requires a few hours each day outside of school hours.

Furnished rooms within a few blocks of the new college building are reasonable in price. The majority of students have room-mates and pay about \$2.50 a week. Many of the ladies room at the Y. W. C. A. where they can get board and room for \$6.50 a week. Good light-housekeeping rooms can be secured. We have a good list of rooms and shall be glad to help you in getting comfortably located.

Tuition for six weeks is \$30, twelve weeks' \$54, twenty-four weeks \$96 and forty-eight weeks \$180. It is cheaper to pay in advance for a long term.

Students may enter at any time, as our school is in session the year round. Public school teachers who wish to attend our six weeks' summer term will find it an advantage to enter as soon as their school is out in May or June.

Columbus is a very beautiful city and is considered by most people an inexpensive place to live. We have all kinds of attractions in the way of theaters, parks, etc. Many of the pulpits in the various churches are filled by men with national reputations as speakers. We have the penitentiary, Ohio State University and other state institutions and colleges which students visit. All of these make Columbus a fine place in which to spend your vacation. Our college faces one of the most beautiful parks in the city. Salaries received by students when leaving school depend altogether upon the student and the position. Last year the lowest salary received was \$1200 and the highest \$2700. A course in the Zanerian will help you to increase your salary. There are excellent opportunities in penmanship. The large cities pay very attractive salaries but t.ey require teachers who are thoroughly trained and who can secure results.

Our Employment Department helps pupils free in securing positions. We are always glad to help former students in securing other or better positions. Many pupils have been relocated many times. In the past we have been very successful in locating pupils. Our aim is to locate every pupil in the position he is best qualified to fill. Superintendents and school officials from all parts of the country come to us for teachers and supervisors.

The demand for persons qualified to teach or supervise writing is increasing from year to year. Persons of average intelligence having a liking for penmanship can succeed. For the past few years it has been difficult to fill all vacancies. We expect the demand for teachers this coming year to be large.

The general education of a teacher or supervisor of writing should be the same as a regular teacher. The better educated, the better the chances are for advancement, and for securing the highest pay. If you are short on education, you may succeed in securing a position and improving your general education in the evenings and during vacations as many of the best teachers of today have done.

Contrary to previous announcement there will be no Zaner Method Summer School in Chicago.
